In accordance with state requirements, <u>each year</u> middle school students receive instruction in the following areas:

- Social Studies









English Language Arts, Social Studies, Science, and Mathematics offer a Gifted and Talented (G/T) option for instruction. Mathematics has an above-grade level course in addition to the G/T options.

- 1. Teach kids that intelligence isn't fixed. They can grow their brains through lifelong learning.
- 2. Talk to students about postsecondary planning and potential careers. Tell them you believe in them and in their success.
- 3. Keep the communication lines open set aside time to regularly talk about feelings and friendships.

Tips For Parents: Supporting Your Child's Development Of Positive Academic Behaviors

- Talk to your child about school and how they are feeling.
- Create a regular time and routine for homework completion.
- Encourage your child to be responsible, for example regularly checking Canvas.
- Take school attendance seriously
- Build your student's confidence and identify areas of strength
- Create a bedtime routine and limit screen time
